## **Greetings from Anne**

Luke's story of the angels, shepherds and the birth of a baby in his second chapter is really a very simple story.

Landless shepherds were out in the hills watching their sheep in the dark. They were cold and trying to stay awake when something happened. An angel appeared to them. (Angels in the Bible are always Messengers of God).

The shepherds were terrified. The angel's news was that a baby was born in Bethlehem, and they should go and see him. Then a chorus of them sang of peace on earth, and good will to all.

They went to Bethlehem, found a tiny baby, told his parents what they had been told and left to go back to their sheep.

Not much of a story. Nothing had changed. They were still shepherds. They were still poor, cold, and out with the sheep in the dark of night.

And yet, everything had changed! They returned "praising God for all they had heard and seen". Praising him for what? Another baby born into poverty and a hard life? A vision of a world that could come alive in peace and justice, perhaps through this baby as he grew up?

Maybe this is our story too. There are moments when we catch a glimpse of hope for ourselves, for our world. It may be as we celebrate the birth of a grand-baby with a whole life to live in front of her. It may come in the holy darkness just before we fall asleep.

Perhaps it comes in the person of an elder who shows us how to live with an enthusiasm for life even as her body wears out. Perhaps we catch a glimpse of what life could be in the kindness someone shows us or others unexpectedly.

This is an old story that we celebrate every year. Yet, it is also a wondrous story of how, for a few moments, some sheep herders stopped and wondered to see a newborn baby.

May you celebrate this hope that appears so unexpectedly when we least expect it. May you find time to wonder, to live so that your small bit of world is better than its worst moments because you are in it.
