The Healing of the Seven Generations (H7G) is located in downtown Kitchener at 300 Frederick St. They work with individuals overcoming the trauma of the residential legacy, offering culturally accessible therapeutic healing programming. They also provide community training sessions to empower healthier communities. Programs encompass work with all groups and include drumming circles, youth conferences, canoe days, language classes and much more. You may be familiar with the backpack and Christmas gift programs, and the annual community walks for Red Dress Day (coming in May) and The Day for Truth and Reconciliation.
